It is my privilege to welcome you to the 2024 Impact Report for the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust. As I reflect on my first year as Chair, I am both humbled and inspired by the incredible work carried out by the Trust and the charities we support. Taking on this role from my esteemed predecessor, Ken Barclay, has been an honour, and I am committed to building on the remarkable foundation he established.

This year has been a landmark one for the Trust. We received a record-breaking number of applications, a testament to the ever-growing need for support in communities across Scotland. The increasing demand reflects the challenging circumstances many charities face, yet it also highlights their unwavering commitment to improving the lives of children and young people. In response, the Trust has distributed over £600k to 252 charities, ensuring that our funding makes a meaningful and lasting impact where it is needed most.

One of the most rewarding aspects of my role this year has been visiting some of the extraordinary organisations we have been privileged to support. Among them was Scottish Families Affected by Alcohol and Drugs, a national charity doing vital work to support families impacted by substance use. Through their Routes service, they provide lifechanging support for young people aged 12 to 26 whose lives have been deeply affected by the challenges of family substance use.

During my visit, I had the opportunity to meet young people who have found hope and resilience through the Routes

programme. I listened to their stories of overcoming stigma, navigating barriers in education, and building confidence for brighter futures. I also met the dedicated team members whose compassion, perseverance, and practical support make this transformation possible. Whether it's guiding a young person through a school placement or celebrating their achievements in gaining qualifications, the impact of their work is profound.

One young person I spoke with shared how the support they received helped them rediscover their aspirations and pursue their first job — an accomplishment that would have seemed impossible without the stability and encouragement provided by Routes. It is this kind of long-term, tailored support that makes charities like Scottish Families so invaluable. The £4,000 grant awarded to their Routes service is a shining example of how your generosity as players of the Scottish Children's Lottery directly changes lives.

As we reflect on the achievements of 2024, it is vital to acknowledge the collective effort behind these successes. To the charities tirelessly working on the front lines to support children and young people: thank you. Your dedication and ingenuity inspire us all. To the team at the Scottish Children's Lottery for their exceptional work in managing the day-to-day operations that make our mission possible. To the Board of Trustees, thank you for your guidance and unwavering commitment to ensuring that our funding is impactful, equitable, and far-reaching.

# Nourishing Young Lives: Impact of Dundee Bairns



Dundee Bairns is a dedicated children's charity committed to alleviating child poverty in Dundee. Our mission is to ensure that every child has access to basic necessities, including food, clothing, and essential activities. We support community projects in areas of high multiple deprivation, targeting the most vulnerable children to make a positive impact on their lives.

#### Support from Scottish Children's Lottery

We are thrilled to announce that Dundee Bairns received a generous £4,000 grant from the Scottish Children's Lottery. This funding has been instrumental in supporting our Fun and Food Programme, which provides free meals and activities to primary-aged children across Dundee during the school holidays. £4,000 has helped us to provide approximately 1,600 lunches to children across the school and community projects that we support.

#### **Impact Story**

The £4,000 grant has enabled us to deliver hundreds of nutritious meals and engaging activities to children

who might otherwise go without during the holidays. For example, in summer 2024, we supported 79 community projects, schools and groups to deliver Fun and Food.

One mum wrote to Dundee Bairns to express her gratitude for the support received over the period:

"I just wanted to say a massive thank you for the support given to our group by Dundee Bairns – we have had the best summer and your provision has really helped to take the load off."

This mum is a participant in a local group which has been brought together and supported by the local Communities Officer to help parents make friends and support each other. The group started with just a few members and with the support of the Officer, managed to make an application to Dundee Bairns for funding to help the group access a day out to a local farm park with packed lunches included. This was a trip that the parents would not have been able to afford otherwise and ensured that families were able to come together, build community where they might have otherwise had none and make lasting memories with their children, without having to worry about where their next meal might come from.



# A Message from Head of Charity Operations

As I reflect on 2024, a year of extraordinary demand and equally extraordinary dedication, I am filled with immense pride for the work of the Scottish Children's Lottery, the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust and the charities we have been privileged to support. This year has underscored the theme of this report: "Rising Needs, Lasting Impact: Every Grant Counts."

The challenges facing charities across Scotland continue to grow. With the backdrop of economic uncertainty, rising austerity measures, and the relentless pressures of the cost-of-living crisis, organisations are finding it harder than ever to secure the funding they need to sustain their vital services. Simultaneously, the demand for these services has increased as more children and young people seek support. These twin pressures have highlighted the essential role of the Trust in providing a lifeline for charities working tirelessly to meet these growing needs.

This year, we witnessed yet another significant surge in funding applications, reflecting the ever-growing needs of Scotland's charitable sector. Each proposal we reviewed showcased remarkable dedication and ingenuity in addressing the challenges faced by children and young people. However, with demand for support continuing to rise, we faced the difficult reality of being unable to fund every deserving application. Despite this challenge, we remain steadfast in our commitment to ensuring every grant we award drives meaningful and lasting change in the lives of those who need it most.

One of the most rewarding aspects of my role as Head of Charity Operations is the opportunity to visit and meet the organisations we support. These visits are the heart of our mission, allowing me to witness first-hand the transformative work being done across Scotland. They provide a chance to connect with the dedicated teams behind these efforts, hear directly from the young people they support, and ensure our approach aligns with their needs.

Among the many visits I made this year, one particularly moving experience was with Team Jak Foundation, a charity founded in 2015 by the inspirational teenager Jak Trueman before he passed away at just 15 years old. Team Jak provides emotional, social, and practical support to children and young people aged 0–25 with cancer, as well as their families, friends, and those bereaved across Scotland.

Their work is unparalleled, offering lifelong support through Jak's Den in Livingston and Aberdeen, alongside popups in Fife, Paisley, Glasgow, and Edinburgh children's hospitals. From counselling and music therapy to activities designed to create smiles, Team Jak helps families navigate life with and beyond cancer.

We partnered with Team Jak to produce a number of charity videos, capturing the incredible impact of their services. We had the privilege of spending time with Baileigh and her family, as well as Corey and his family, hearing their heartfelt stories of resilience and hope. Meeting both families was profoundly moving and underscored the importance of providing understanding and support during such challenging times.

These experiences remind us of the critical role organisations like Team Jak play in easing the journey for families facing the unimaginable. You can learn more about their inspiring work in the feature story later in this report.

This year, I have visited dozens of charities, each working tirelessly to address the unique challenges faced by the communities they serve. From small grassroots organisations to nationally recognised charities, every visit reinforced the scale of the challenges and the remarkable dedication of those on the frontlines.

As we look back on 2024, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to everyone who has made this work possible. To the charities, thank you for your tireless commitment to creating a better future. To the Board of Trustees, your guidance and support are invaluable. And to the players of the Scottish Children's Lottery, you are the backbone of everything we do. Without your generosity, none of this would be possible.

Looking ahead, I am both mindful of the challenges and optimistic about the impact we can continue to make. The need for support will only grow, but so too will our resolve to ensure that every child and young person in Scotland has the opportunity to reach their full potential.

# From Cities to Villages

## Mapping our Reach across Scotland

In 2024, the Scottish Children's Lottery awarded more than £600k in funding, supporting 252 grant awards and positively impacting the lives of 83,000 children and young people across Scotland.

This map highlights the distribution of these grants, illustrating the extensive reach of our funding. While some charities received multiple awards or carried out projects in multiple locations, others delivered initiatives classified as Scotland-wide, ensuring support reaches those who need it most.

This also explains the disparity between the total grant awards and the number of activities conducted throughout the country, as some organisations implement multiple projects across different regions.

Our funding continues to make a meaningful difference, strengthening communities and creating opportunities for children and young people throughout the country.

# More Than a Carer: Creating Space for Young People to Thrive



At Carers Trust Scotland, we ensure unpaid carers are heard, valued and get the support, advice and resources they need to live fulfilling lives alongside caring. We partner with 25 local carer organisations across Scotland, providing a full range of services and programmes that ease the challenges, and amplify carers' voices to influence policy and change.

There are around **800,000** people in Scotland today, including **30,000** young people, who support someone who is ill, disabled, suffers from mental health problems or addiction. Carers can be any age, in every community and within every cultural setting. Three in five of us will take on a caring role in our lifetime.

Thanks to the generosity of the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust, we received £3,000 in support of our annual event, The Scottish Young Carers Festival. Around 500 young people from across Scotland were invited to come together to have a break from caring, have their say on what matters to them, make friends, and most importantly, have fun. The festival is designed by young carers for young carers. They choose activities and workshops they'd enjoy the most.

is great, but it's hard to be fully present and enjoy myself. My mind is always on my mum. Being a young carer is a full-time job. We can't switch it off, even if we aren't with the person we care for. We are always thinking about them, worrying about them, and those constant thoughts prevent us from having a mental break. 11

Thanks to this donation, we created a Wellbeing Zone at the festival. With a focus on self-care and rest, we provided massages, guided meditation and arts and crafts workshops for young people, in a calm and quiet environment. When about a third of the young people at the festival told us they don't get regular breaks from

caring, the Wellbeing Zone became especially important. We wanted to make sure that they find time for themselves, and as one young carer put it; to be "anti-stressed!" Away from the high-energy excitement of bouncy castles and ziplines, The Wellbeing Zone gave young people a moment to recharge, creating a more meaningful break.

We surveyed attendees throughout the festival, and the statistics highlight just how needed the Scottish Young Carers Festival is for this group of young people:

- \* 91% made new friends and tried something new
- \* 96% felt they had a break from caring
- \* 99% had fun

# **Charity Boost:**

## Empowering Charities to Make a Difference

At the Scottish Children's Lottery, we believe in the power of community and the extraordinary work of charities supporting children and young people across Scotland. That's why we created Charity Boost; an initiative designed to help organisations generate unrestricted funding effortlessly, so they can focus on what truly matters—making a difference.

Charity Boost enables registered charities to earn 20% of every ticket placed on the Scottish Children's Lottery by their supporters, simply by encouraging participation through a designated link on their website. This additional funding is unrestricted, allowing charities the flexibility to channel resources where they're needed most.

The programme is simple to set up and comes with comprehensive support, including custom promotional materials, email templates, and social media resources to help charities reach their audiences effectively.

#### A Lasting Impact

Charity Boost has already made a significant difference for organisations across Scotland. For example:

★ Big Hearts Community Trust received £1,000, enabling them to support 100 children through meals, snacks, and activities. As the official charity of Heart of Midlothian FC, Big Hearts uses the power of football to deliver programs that promote mental health, equality, and social connections.





# Our Charity **Boost Partners**















Team Jak Foundation earned £1,113 to support 90 young people through their cancer journeys. With activities at Jak's Den HQ, pop-up events, and outreach programs, Team Jak provides emotional and practical support to children and young people across Scotland, ensuring they never feel alone during difficult times.

Teapot Trust received £1,018 in funding to bring transformative art therapy to over 1,100 children and young people with chronic health conditions. Their work reduces anxiety, eases strain on families, and prevents mental health issues from escalating, ensuring vulnerable children have the emotional tools to cope.

In 2024, Charity Boost partners collectively received an incredible £21,806, supporting thousands of children and young people across the country.

#### Eligibility and How to Apply

Charity Boost is open to registered charities in Scotland with a focus on supporting children, young people, and their families. Applicants must have up-to-date accounts and demonstrate how their work addresses and alleviates the challenges of poverty, social exclusion, deprivation or disability and illness.

Charities interested in joining the initiative are invited to complete the Charity Boost registration form via our Grant Management platform. After verification, successful applicants receive terms of funding and ongoing support to help them maximise their impact.

Please note that statutory agencies, Local Authorities, Housing Associations, Community Interest Companies (CICs), and projects outside Scotland are ineligible for the programme.

Charity Boost isn't just about raising funds—it's about building partnerships and empowering charities to continue their vital work. By joining the initiative, organisations gain access to an innovative funding stream supported by the trusted Scottish Children's Lottery brand. # **Shaping Brighter Futures:**

### The Impact of the Bright Futures Fund

In its inaugural year, the Bright Futures Fund awarded grants to 99 charities, directly impacting over 15,000 children and young people. Each organisation is unique, but all share a commitment to nurturing brighter futures.

At the close of 2024, a ground-breaking initiative was launched—the **Bright Futures Fund**. This joint venture between ourselves, the **Scottish Children's Lottery Trust (SCLT)** and the **Jackpot Community Trust (JCT)**, aims to support charities across Scotland that empower children and young people. Together, our two organisations pooled £100,000, creating a fund dedicated to addressing key challenges faced by Scotland's most vulnerable communities.

The Bright Futures Fund seeks to make a difference in tangible ways, funding projects ranging from cost-of-living support and educational initiatives to sports equipment and mentoring programs. Grants of £1,000 are awarded to registered charities with a focus on organisations working directly with those most at risk of poverty's effects.

#### The Power of Partnership

The fund exemplifies the power of collaboration. SCLT, with its roots in the **Scottish Children's Lottery**, administers the grants, managing applications, and ensuring funds reach deserving charities efficiently. Meanwhile, JCT, supported by **The Scotto**, provides vital financial resources and oversight. Together, they've created an accessible and impactful funding stream that prioritises the needs of local communities.

#### **Supporting Scotland's Charities**

Forces Children Scotland received funding to assist them in enhancing their youth participation programmes. With years of experience supporting children from armed forces families, this charity provides a range of services, including mental health support, leadership development, and advocacy for children's rights. Their youth forums, funded by the Bright Futures Fund, empower young people to share their voices, build confidence, and foster peer connections.

Russell Frith, CEO of Forces Children Scotland, shared: "This funding enables us to provide safe spaces for young people to connect, share their stories, and develop the skills needed to thrive in challenging circumstances. The impact on their mental health and confidence is immeasurable."







The **3rd Falkirk Boys' Brigade Company** also benefited from the fund, using the grant to subsidise a spring weekend trip to Scott Lodge, Glen Doll. For many of the young participants, this was their first opportunity to experience the great outdoors, fostering confidence, team-building, and a love of hillwalking. Captain Russell Croal expressed his gratitude: "Thanks to the Bright Futures Fund, we've removed financial barriers, ensuring all our young people can enjoy this incredible experience."

Similarly, Clyde FC Community used their grant to deliver after-school clubs in under-served schools. By combining football with lessons on healthy lifestyles and literacy, these clubs provide an outlet for physical activity and learning, reaching children who might otherwise lack such opportunities.

#### A Vision for Growth

Looking ahead, SCLT and JCT are committed to expanding the Bright Futures Fund, ensuring even more children and young people benefit. Plans are in place to grow the fund while maintaining a simple application process, allowing charities to focus their time where it matters most - supporting their communities.

The Bright Futures Fund represents more than financial support; it's a lifeline for charities dedicated to giving Scotland's children the bright futures they deserve.





































































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














































# A World of Possibilities: Friends of Ashton

# Supporting Children with Complex Needs

We are a special needs school with a roll of 192 pupils. All our students have profound, severe and complex learning and physical disabilities and need a high level of support and intervention daily. 108 of our pupils are autistic. These students, in particular, experience significant barriers, resulting from difficulties in sensory processing, to communication, independence and social skills. Their disabilities often pose challenges to interrelating with other people.

We are passionate about addressing these issues and helping our students develop their skills and confidence, helping them to make a safe transition into adult life and supported independence once they leave our School

Consequently, we undertook an ambitious project to create a state-of-the-art, wheelchair-accessible, immersive room. After a year of fundraising and a number of delays due to supplier changes and installation hiccups our immersive room opened in November 2024, with its official inauguration on our funder's Open Day on 13th November. This could not have happened if not for the generous support of The Scottish Children's Lottery, which generously donated £4,000 towards this project.

Its objective is to develop each individual student's sensory regulation, enhanced communication, motor skills and coordination and emotional well-being to a level where they can function with confidence within the family and wider community.



Our immersive room provides a safe and controlled setting where sensory stimuli - such as lights, sounds, textures, and visuals - can be adjusted to suit the child's specific needs. Through its interactive floor and wall projection system, which includes built-in motion sensors, children can self-regulate their sensory intake. For example, if a child becomes overstimulated, they can retreat to a quieter area with calming visuals to regain a sense of balance. By helping children manage their sensory input, immersive rooms reduce anxiety and enhance focus, ultimately leading to better learning and engagement. As one parent stated: "OMG this looks amazing! Caleb will love it!! He'll lay down and just watch until he realises u can touch it to change."

Where our immersive room really scores is as a tool for better communication. Social interactions can be challenging for children with autism, as they may struggle with interpreting social cues and engaging with peers. Immersive rooms provide structured activities that encourage cooperative play and interaction. For example, group activities using interactive projections on walls or floors can prompt children to work together in a fun and engaging manner. These activities help build essential social skills, such as turn-taking, sharing, and collaboration. Because immersive rooms can be tailored to create positive and low-pressure environments, children are more likely to become more resilient to new social situations or unfamiliar environments and feel comfortable participating in social interactions.

Although early days, we have already seen the immense benefit and potential that our immersive room has had on our pupil's emotional well-being. It has helped them become more engaged, more receptive to learning and better able to communicate with each other, staff and visitors.















## Meet Our Board

The role of a Trustee within a charity is pivotal, representing the cornerstone of effective governance and responsible leadership. Trustees play a crucial part in shaping the organisation's strategic direction and safeguarding its mission.

Trustees with the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust oversee the distribution of funds generated through the Scottish Children's Lottery, and ensure the initiatives and projects who receive a grant award contribute to local initiatives addressing poverty, social exclusion, deprivation, disability, or illness.

#### LIZ BYRNE - CHAIR

Liz was appointed as the Chair of the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust in August 2024.

She has previously worked in the public sector in urban regeneration, equal opportunities and skills (Strathclyde Regional Council, Glasgow City Council, Skills Development Scotland), in the third sector as Deputy Director of The Prince's Trust (Scotland) and in the private sector in economic development/skills consultancy (Associate Director of Ekosgen and as Director of her own company - EMB Consulting Ltd).

Liz retired early from paid work in 2021. As well as chairing the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust, she is a Panel Member, Chair and Facilitator for Children's Hearings Scotland and an Ambassador for Tricky Hat Productions.



#### **VICKI MILLER**

Vicki Miller became Chief Executive of VisitScotland in October 2024, leading the organisation's vision to position Scotland as a world-class tourism destination. With a background in energy, financial services, and tourism, she has held key roles at Dumfries and Galloway Tourist Board and VisitScotland, where she shaped marketing and digital strategies.

A passionate advocate for Scotland's visitor economy, Vicki has driven major recovery initiatives and international campaigns. As a trustee of the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust, she is committed to ensuring funds create meaningful opportunities for young people across Scotland.



#### MICHELLE KINNAIRD

Michelle Kinnaird is Director of Business Growth at Scottish Enterprise, leading efforts to expand Scotland's private sector funding market. With a strong background in investment management, she ensures that early-stage and scaling SMEs have access to the growth capital they need to thrive.

# More Than Play: Creating Communities of Support at The Yard



The Yard is Scotland's charity providing adventure play opportunities for disabled children and young people. It builds thriving communities of support to enrich the lives of the whole family. Families with disabled children often face financial strain, isolation, and difficulties accessing services. The Yard champions inclusion through its welcoming environment, dynamic play spaces, and essential resources that enhance whole family wellbeing.

The Yard received £4,000 from SCLT towards core costs, which is a huge help during a period of growth. Contributions towards core costs mean The Yard can grow its capacity as an organisation, deliver more services and reach more children, young people and families. The Yard has recently taken ownership of the Dundee building it's been operating from for a decade and begun to renovate it. At the same time, it has started renovating its first ever centre in Glasgow, which is due to open in summer 2025. The Yard grew its reach to 2,800 young people in 2024 and thanks to SCLT will reach hundreds more in 2025.

It costs three times as much to raise a disabled child, so Yard families are at increased risk of poverty, isolation and inequality. Families often experience long waiting lists for diagnosis and support. They have difficulties accessing suitable early year's provision and out of school care and childcare, as well as accessible play and leisure activities for their child. Sadly, families also often experience



judgement from others and have fewer opportunities to spend quality time as a family.

At The Yard families find a warm welcome and a dynamic play space alongside information and guidance to support whole-family resilience and wellbeing. The Yard builds empowering communities where families support each other, learn from each other and walk alongside each other on a journey that can often be complex and challenging. It provides support from birth to age 25 at the point of need and without a diagnosis, enabling young people to develop social and emotional skills that serve them in the wider world.

The Yard's most recent family feedback survey found 87% of children have more fun in their life thanks to the Yard, and 81% of children have more chances to take safe risks. Crucially 78% of parents said their child is happier.

Through the power of play, mums and dads get the freedom to relax, make friends with other parents, and get advice on what's available to help the whole family live life to the full.

As a result, 92% of families feel Yard staff are kind and understanding, 79% feel less isolated thanks to the Yard and 72% of parents or carers are more confident talking about their child's disability with others.

Gillian, a single parent to 10-year-old Jack, who has autism, and 8-year-old Max, says the rigidity and routine that makes Jack feel safe can act as a barrier to meeting other parents and children.

"His screams of joy and stimming invites unwanted looks and sniggers from parents of neurotypical children in a regular play park. The saying 'a parent is only as happy as their unhappiest child' is very poignant. When Jack is struggling, the three of us struggle..."

The Yard provides a space for the whole family to be themselves, find valuable support, and to play. When they come through the doors, Gillian says: "Jack can stim and scream as much as he wants, and absolutely no one bats an eyelid. We walk into a smiling member of staff, who knows myself and my children by name, and I instantly feel I can breathe again, and my shoulders relax."





# Community, Care and Connection: Touch of Love's Story

Touch of Love Outreach is a grassroots charity based in Aberdeen. Our mission is to bring hope and support to the most vulnerable in our community. We work with ethnic minority families and individuals facing the toughest challenges, from poverty and illness to social exclusion and financial hardship. We're proud to offer a lifeline to those in need, and our reach extends far beyond Aberdeen, with programmes and workshops that inspire and empower them.

One of our most transformative initiatives is the Young Achievers' Club, which has touched the lives of over 550 minority ethnic Young Scots aged 5 to 21. Many of these young people are part of families that have recently migrated to the UK. They face hurdles like financial instability, limited access to public funds, and social isolation. The Young Achievers' Club helps bridge these gaps, creating a space where ethnic minority Young Scots can connect, grow, and thrive. It provides an opportunity for them to integrate into their community while breaking cycles of exclusion and child poverty.

For many ethnic minority families, survival means

making impossible choices whether to buy food or heat their homes. Rising costs, compounded by restricted

work opportunities, mean essentials like nutritious meals are often out of reach. Many parents, particularly women who care for family members with disabilities, are unable to work full-time, further deepening the economic strain.

In December 2024, we received £4,000 funding from the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust (SCLT). This funding has truly made a difference in the lives of the ethnic minority young people . It enabled us to ensure that every ethnic minority Young Scot in our youth club could take home a weekly food parcel. For many, this parcel is essential, providing much-needed meals to families struggling to make ends meet.

Currently, more than 60 Ethnic Minority Young Scots visit our TOL Young Achievers' Club every week, and we distribute around 60 food parcels. These food parcels provide immediate relief to Young Scots from ethnic minority families whose parents battle the rising cost of



parcels because they help my mum worry less. She always tries to make sure we have enough, but sometimes it's hard. When I bring home a food parcel, I feel like I've done something to help her. It's not just food; it's something that makes us feel less alone. 11

living and the challenges of financial insecurity. However, with the increasing pressure of the economic climate, we expect this number to grow.

The young and new Scots we support face complex challenges, including social isolation, poor mental health, and, for many, the inability of these families to access public funds due to their immigration status. This funding has allowed us to step in where no one else can, directly addressing these needs and ensuring that no child goes hungry.

The support also extended to creating special moments. During the festive season, we distributed Christmas gift bags to over 200 Young Scots from low-income families. These bags, filled with festive treats and toys, brought joy to families who often cannot prioritise holiday celebrations due to the need to focus on essentials like food and heating. For many ethnic minority Young Scots, these gifts were the only presents they received, ensuring they could experience the magic of the holidays despite difficult circumstances.

66 Christmas was always just another day for us because we couldn't afford anything extra. But when I got the gift bag, I felt so happy. It had snacks and toys I didn't expect, and for once, it really felt like Christmas. It made me feel special, like someone cared. 11

# A Story for Every Child: Making Reading Fun and Accessible

Wigtown Festival Company is a rural charity working across southwest Scotland that runs the annual Wigtown Book Festivals as well as other year-round programmes with children and young people. We see ourselves as using culture to help regenerate our local community socially and economically. As our Vision statement says: "A community of books changes lives." In 2024, we received £4,000 from the Scottish Children's Lottery to support our Big Dog Schools Tour.

Meeting an author who can bring a book to life, make you think and make you laugh, can change a child's attitude to reading. The aim of the Schools Tour is to ensure as many children as possible in Dumfries & Galloway have that horizon-expanding opportunity. This has become more vital than ever since Covid when we've seen a widening in the attainment gap.

According to a report from the UK Social Mobility Commission, one in four primary pupils in Dumfries & Galloway is below the national average of expected reading and writing levels. Meanwhile, reading for pleasure - which is known to be one of the best indicators of a child's future success - has declined.

Pre-Covid, we approached things differently, inviting schools to bring children to a special day at Wigtown Book

Festival. But increasingly poor transport options make this harder and it disadvantaged certain schools. By bringing writers to the children instead, with Scottish Children's Lottery's help we could make sure that even the most remote communities had a chance to take part. We were also better able to prioritise applications to participate from schools in areas of multiple deprivation.

When we pick our writers for the tour, one of the first things we want is stage presence as well as skill with a pen: Alastair Chisholm, Ross Mackenzie, Chae Strathie and Renita Boyle are all award-winners but they are all also forces of nature. As they crammed into the car on a chilly autumn morning - making sure not to crush Renita's guitar - it was clear it was going to be a rambunctious week.

Over the five days, the authors collectively visited a total of 38 schools across Dumfries & Galloway, offering interactive sessions from nursery age to Primary 7. From tiny villages such as Dunscore, to the centre of Dumfries, every session was packed, with more than 1,700 children attending for free. The general enthusiasm was summed up by a pupil from Park Primary in Stranraer: "It was great to see a real-life author!"

Despite so many competing pressures on their time, the teachers recognised the particular value of these sessions in transforming children's attitudes. In the words of one





teacher from a Dumfries school visited by Ross Mackenzie: "Our group was made up of less able pupils who do not see reading as a priority or something 'for them'. The author invited them to look at this in a new way, which we hope will have an impact. The idea that anyone can write and that there is a book out there for everyone was powerful."

Hearing Scots used creatively was also cited as a positive. Julie Irving, head teacher at Gatehouse of Fleet Primary, says: "It's so good to have the children hear other people telling stories and singing songs, so it's not just the teacher. It inspired them to join in. More familiarity with some Scots, will help with our Scots Poems for Burns."









# A Haven of Hope: The Impact of Scottish Children's Lottery Trust on Team Jak



At Jak's Den, every smile, every shared moment, and every act of kindness is a testament to the unwavering support of those who believe in our mission. Since 2015, we have been a place of refuge and strength for children and young people with cancer, their families, friends, and those bereaved. But we do not walk this journey alone. Thanks to the incredible generosity of the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust (SCLT), we have been able to touch the lives of over 1,000 young people, providing emotional, social, and practical support that is truly life-changing.

In 2024, we had the privilege of welcoming the SCLT's team to our world, where they captured the essence of what we do in a series of heartfelt charity videos. Through the powerful stories of families like Baileigh's and Corey's, we saw first-hand the profound impact of our services. These videos not only showcased the resilience of our young warriors but also underscored the critical need for continued support to ensure we can keep making a difference.

Among the many projects SCLT has funded, their support of our Special Angel Families Retreat has been particularly meaningful. This initiative provides a space for families to find solace, connection, and healing—a precious opportunity to create memories and navigate their grief with a community that truly understands. It is our hope to offer this retreat once again, should we be fortunate enough to secure further funding.

Jak's Den is built on love, and every programme we offer is shaped by lived experience. Our emphasis on emotional and social support extends beyond the child facing cancer; we provide dedicated sibling support, palliative care, and bereavement services tailored to each family's unique journey. With 445 registered families across Scotland and approximately 90 children actively engaged in our weekly activities, the need for what we do has never been greater.

Yet, despite our reach, many still say Team Jak and Jak's Den remain one of the best-kept secrets in children's cancer support. With partners like SCLT by our side, raising awareness and providing financial backing, we are determined to change that. Because every child, every family, deserves a place where they can find joy, support, and the strength to keep fighting.

On behalf of all our families, we thank the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust for believing in us and for making an immeasurable impact on the lives of so many. Together, we will continue to turn Jak's vision into a lasting legacy of love and hope.















# Striking a Chord: Empowering Young People Through Music



At The Loft Youth Project, we look to provide a one stop shop for all young people in Keith and Strathisla to learn, grow, and connect. Our drop-in centre and activity-based programs are designed to empower young people from disadvantaged backgrounds, with the aim of giving them opportunities they might not otherwise have access to in everyday life. Thanks to the generous £3,000 funding from the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust, in 2024, we were able to launch an exciting new music initiative; one that has truly transformed the experiences of our young people.

Music has the ability to bring people together, build confidence, and spark creativity. When some of our young people expressed a desire to start a band, we knew we had to make it happen. With SCLT's support, we were able to purchase essential equipment such as microphones, guitars, drumsticks, music stands—and enlist the mentorship of a professional band in the local area to guide our young musicians.

#### That's how FOLT was born.

Meeting every second Friday, FOLT (a play on Loft) quickly became more than just a band; it became a community. Some members picked up instruments for the first time, while others found their niche behind the scenes—from

designing logos, creating social media posters, setting up and closing the stage area, everyone had a role, and that sense of team spirit was invaluable.

Through months of dedication, practice, and a few challenges along the way, the band grew in confidence. We watched as young people who were once hesitant to perform found their voices. They worked through obstacles together, even restructuring the band when needed to ensure everyone felt included. Their passion and resilience culminated in live performances, where members proudly showcased their newly found skills in front of an audience of family, friends, and peers. Seeing their faces light up with pride was a moment we'll never forget.

Beyond music, funding from the trust also allowed us to provide snacks and refreshments at our sessions. For many of our young people, financial hardship makes even the smallest comforts inaccessible. By ensuring that every participant had access to food and drinks, this creates an environment where everyone feels equal, supported, and valued.

The impact of this project has allowed our young people to form lasting friendships, gain confidence, and develop new skills that will stay with them for life. We are immensely grateful to the Scottish Children's Lottery Trust for believing in our vision and helping us make this dream a reality.

At The Loft Youth Project, we see first hand the difference these opportunities make. And with continued support, we'll keep providing young people with the space, encouragement, and resources they need to thrive.








